DOCTOR DUBIOUS has been performing jazz in the New Orleans and Chicago styles since 1998 in the tri-state area. They have performed at First Nights in Teaneck, Montclair, Maplewood-South Orange and the Morris County area and for numerous public, corporate and private events.

Tom Duncan is Doctor Dubious and plays clarinet as well as alto and C melody saxophones to lead the group.

Bart Bartholomew on cornet is lead horn on just about every tune and brings a twenty-first century sensitivity to the 20's and 30's music of Louis Armstrong and Bix Beiderbecke.

Dick Dreiwitz began playing in the early 1950's and has learned from and worked with such legends as Willie The Lion Smith, Lee Blair, Zutty Singleton, and Herb Hall.

Barbara Dreiwitz has the singular distinction of being the only female tuba player active in the field of classic jazz in the Western Hemisphere! Her career ranges from small jazz groups in New York City to cabaret with Julie Wilson.

Karen Bartholomew is a pianist who is as comfortable and entertaining singing in the style of the 20's and 30's as she is proficient and impressive in modern jazz vocals and arrangements.

Dave Brown is a trumpet man but does most of his work on drums, dropping the sticks to join Bart Bartholomew for two

trumpet features reminiscent of Louis Armstrong and King Oliver.

Monroe Quinn is a master of styles on the banjo and guitar and brings a rock steady beat and great soloing to the hot jazz style.

All in the band live in New Jersey. One of the band's favorites is an ode to Jersey girls called "Hey Engineer." They will play and sing it at the drop of a hat and you might find it becoming one of your favorites, too.

Speaking of academics, the Dubious title is neither medical nor academic, but just for fun. Bart, however, earned a doctorate in music from Columbia University and Karen holds a master's degree in jazz vocal performance from NYU. Dave is retired from the Teaneck Public School System and holds a master's degree in jazz performance from SUNY-Purchase. Bart is on the faculty at Yeshiva University; Karen retired from teaching; Barbara continues to be regularly occupied in the New York City area as one of the busiest freelancers in the traditional jazz field; Tom is retired from his industrial sales business and is also musically active in choral music; and Dick can be heard regularly these days at Arthur's Tavern in New York.

Doctor Dubious originated as a group of jazz loving and occasionally jamming friends. Their goal is to provide entertaining hot jazz and have some fun along the way.

HERVOTES 2012

Recently, advocates for social justice marked two important anniversaries: The ratification of the 19th amendment giving women the right to vote and the August 1963 civil rights march on Washington.

Both of these moments in history illustrate the power of the collective voices of the disenfranchised when they stand up to be counted. To honor this legacy of action for social justice, NCJW along with 17 other national women's organizations launched a program call **HERVOTES**, a voter education and mobilization effort for women and those who care about women's health and economic rights.

The goal is to take a stand against the attacks on women's economic and health security through a multi organization effort. What action can we take to reach the goal?

The plan is to speak to other women in our lives: moms, daughters, granddaughters, sisters, friends and neighbors. We want to increase voter turnout in the forthcoming 2012 elections,

demand that our voices, women's voices, be heard in the national discussion on jobs, health care education and family economic security.

Think historic laws that are now in danger of being eliminated, cut or weakened by extremist policies at the federal, state and local levels; Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, the Equal Pay Act, the Civil Rights Act, the Affordable Care Act, Title X9 the National Family Planning Program to name a few.

Our work starts now! Join NCJW and HERVOTES today by going to the effort with at least three women in your life. Remember the more folks we reach the greater the impact.

Take action today to make it clear that you support improving the health and economic status of all women.

2011 - A GOOD NCJW YEAR

There is power in our numbers. Together, we have accomplished a lot this year.

Despite attacks in the House on women's reproductive rights, NCJW and our coalition partners were able to **secure funding for Planned Parenthood's** services that provide important medical care to women across the United States.

We've ensured that **more women have access to affordable contraceptives** and domestic violence screenings under the new health care reforms.

LGBT members of the US armed forces can serve openly and with dignity now that the repeal of the discriminatory "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" policy has been enacted.

We stood up to **protect vulnerable families** from bearing the financial burdens of balancing the nation's budget.

Pilot programs are underway to start **Gay-Straight Alliances in Israel public schools** to prevent homophobia and promote tolerance and respect.

Your attention, please! We hope that as committed members of the Bergen County Section, you will want to keep that relationship into the far future by including the section in your estate plans. CALL TO ACTION - NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS

At the start of a new year, we usually make a resolution or two. A New Year's Resolution is a goal someone sets out to accomplish in the coming year. Some common examples are to lose weight, to exercise more and to try something new. Resolutions can also be made to enhance the quality of life of others by donating time as a volunteer, by giving financial support, by courageously speaking out on issues of concern, or by becoming more environmentally responsible. Fulfilling any or all of these resolutions will bring immeasurable rewards to the donor and to those in need. As we start the New Year, STOP and think of what YOU can do for yourself and others.

NCJW BCS members have always worked to make the world a better place. Now our actions are needed more than ever

before. Environmentally, we can use energy efficient bulbs and appliances, shop locally, use fair trade products, and be aware of the land and water uses and abuses in our areas. Health care issues are everywhere; availability, price, and access are constantly changing. Politics and legislation will continue to shape specific elements and timing but the reforms appear to be limited.

Sadly, women's rights are under attack yet again. In 2011, Congress passed various measures designed to prevent women's access to preventive health care, to safe abortions, and to cut federal spending for safety net programs for vulnerable families, including victims of domestic violence. Thirty-two states put young people at risk by not requiring vital medically accurate sex education. Financially, women still make, on average, 77 cents for every dollar that men earn. Our collective voices to right these wrongs must be heard in the coming year. The New Year is the time to resolve to effect change.

A key element of a New Year's Resolution that sets it apart from other resolutions is that it is made in anticipation of new beginnings. A new beginning means there has never been a better time to get involved! We look forward to working with you.

BERGEN COUNTY SECTION ISRAEL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

Our Section's Israel Affairs Committee, is keeping a close watch on issues involving Israel as they occur in the United Nations. We will hear firsthand about Israel's current events from Shari Eshet, Director of NCJW's Israel Office, who will be our guest speaker at our special BCS Open Board meeting on March 13. Her visit will be followed by a study group in April to discuss Israel's political and social issues.

In the meantime, we donate generously each year to Israel's Granting Program which provides funds to teach, support and empower women, children and families throughout Israel. Through these contributions, along with NCJW emergency funds, we were also able to help provide Israeli women and children relatively safe retreats during border attacks.

Since 1999 we have been helping to fund the NCJW Women and Gender Studies program at Tel Aviv University. This is the first program of its kind in the Middle East changing the face of gender studies in Israel forever. NCJW also takes particular pride in advocating for social justice issues in Israel. Several of our members represented our Section at the NCJW Women's Mission to Israel in 2009. This year's biennial mission was held from November 2-8. It provided a special opportunity to see Israel through the lens of NCJW.

COMMUNITY SERVICES

SUMMER CAMBERSHIP

Summer Campership is one of the Community Services that NCJW BCS supports. Each year money is contributed by our section so that children from all over Bergen County have an opportunity to attend summer camp. This year Summer Campership was chosen to receive an additional grant. This grant allowed thirteen children the chance to attend camp for one week. Marian Kugelmass, the chair of Summer Campership will give a presentation at our January meeting and provide additional information about the Summer Campership program. These presentations are being made at our meetings in order to help our members learn more about the many community services which we work so hard to support. Below is a synopsis of some of her remarks.

SHELLY WINNER, Co-Vice President
Community Services

Summer Campership is a public-private non-profit collaboration to provide scholarships to children whose families need, but cannot afford summer day camp. Due to financial need, these children will end up spending the summer home alone and unsupervised by a caring adult, while their parents are at work.

The Summer Campership Fund provides a summer day camp experience that is a precious gift. Much more community support will be needed to enable us to say "Yes" to these children.

Every dollar donated is tax deductible and goes directly to provide scholarships, which are paid directly to the camps. The cost to send a child to camp for one week is approximately \$250.00. The administrative work and record keeping is done by the Volunteer Center of Bergen Center at no cost to the fund. NCJW is a very active and generous collaborator, along with Altrusa Club and Bergen County Council of Churches. We have undertaken several fundraising activities: Tribute cards and Bears for the Season, which generate some funds, but still not enough to meet the current and growing needs of the children. An annual mailing goes out to previous donors and we continue to solicit funds from new sources. We are strategizing and reviewing other possible fundraising activities

The children are from varied ethnic backgrounds: African-American, Caucasian and Hispanic. They live in Dumont, Emerson, Englewood, Garfield, Hackensack, Leonia, Lodi, North Arlington, Oakland, Saddle Brook, Saddle River, South Hackensack and Teaneck. Families are referred to the County Office for Children by local social service agencies, child care providers, religious organizations and elementary schools. All meet the following eligibility criteria:

- resident of Bergen County
- limited family income
- parent(s), grandparent(s) or guardian(s) are employed full time or otherwise unable to provide a safe and stimulating environment for the children over the summer

Every year the number of children in need of scholarships grows and we can only hope to meet this growing need.
