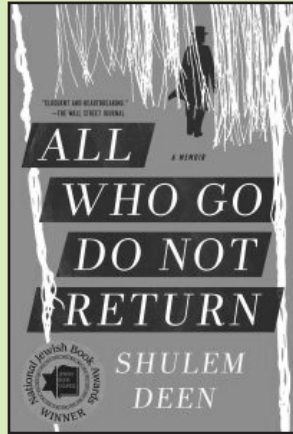

MARCH GENERAL MEETING ALL WHO GO DO NOT RETURN

Shulem Deen, author of the memoir *All Who Go Do Not Return*, and winner of the 2015 New Jersey Book Award, will be the speaker at the NCJW Bergen County Section General Meeting on Tuesday, March 21, 2017. Mr. Deen will discuss his life growing up in and then leaving the *Skverers*, one of the most insular Hasidic sects in the United States. He will share his experiences and insights and discuss the forces that led him to leave the ultra-Orthodox community.

A former columnist for *The Forward*, Mr. Deen's articles have appeared in the *The New Republic* and *Salon*. He was listed in the *Forward 50*, an annual list of American Jews with outsized roles in political and social spheres. He serves as a Board member of *Footsteps*, a New York City-based group providing help to those who have left the ultra-Orthodox community. He started a magazine called *Unpious* and lectures nationwide on his life-changing experiences.

Carol Saline, a journalist, broadcaster, author, and popular public speaker, will speak at the April 25 general meeting. Ms. Saline has co-authored five photo essay books. The best known, *Sisters*, spent 63 weeks on the New York Times bestseller list and sold more than one million copies. Her second book, *Mothers and Daughters*, immediately soared to number one on every national bestseller list. A third bestseller, *Best Friends*, completed the trilogy. In 2005 she wrote the essays for the acclaimed photography book, *A Day in the Life of the American Woman*.

She has also worked as a senior writer at *Philadelphia Magazine*, where she specialized in health, profiles, and investigative reporting. Her articles have appeared in a number of popular magazines. Her national television appearances include the *Oprah Winfrey Show*, the *Phil Donahue Show*, *Larry King Live*, *Inside Edition*, *CBS Good Morning*, *Weekend Today*, and *Good Morning America*.

Our next NCJW BCS trip will be a guided visit to The Great Falls in Paterson, NJ, one of the largest waterfalls in the United States, which played a significant role in the industrial development of the nation. The Falls are a National Landmark and Historic Park and were visited by over 200,000 people last year. This will be followed by a docent-led visit to the Paterson Museum where we will learn about the silk industry. A multi-course lunch at The Brownstone, known for its award-winning cuisine, will be served in a private room. We will then visit The Labor Museum in Haledon for a view of the life of the silk workers, as described by a docent.

MITCH SCHONFELD TO RECEIVE NCJW'S PRESTIGIOUS HANNAH G. SOLOMON AWARD



Mitch Schonfeld is a native of the Bronx and attended the Horace Mann School, graduating in 1973. After receiving a Bachelor of Arts from the State University of NY at Binghamton, he studied early childhood education, teaching the Montessori method for three years. Subsequently, Mr. Schonfeld became a social work professional, receiving a Masters Degree in Social Work in 1983 from the Hunter College School of

Social Work in NYC. His social work career includes several youth services and youth leadership positions with organizations affiliated with the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of Greater New York.

In 1992, Mr. Schonfeld became President/CEO of what is

now known as the Bergen Family Center, currently located in Englewood. The organization is the oldest continuously operating family service agency in Bergen County, having been founded in 1898. Services are provided to 5,000 infants, toddlers, children, youth, families, and older adults annually. NCJW Bergen County Section has supported several programs at Bergen Family Center with volunteers and financial aid for many years. These include its popular HIPPIE program (Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Children), Adult Day Care/Shining Lights (for visually impaired adults and other seniors), and its newest endeavor, NCJW BCS/Renee Guller Infant-Toddler Center.

Mr. Schonfeld and his wife are the parents of three children and live in Teaneck. He has several hobbies, including reading, aerobic exercise, gardening, and music. The Bergen Family Center is fortunate to have him as its leader, and we are pleased to present him with this award.

NCJW BCS MEMBERS JOIN WOMEN'S MARCH ON WASHINGTON

At the pre-dawn hour of 4:45 am on Saturday, January 21, five somber yet determined NCJW BCS members boarded one of the two buses carrying 110 New Jersey women (and a smattering of men) leaving the Central Unitarian Church in Paramus. In all, an estimated 300 New Jersey buses, carrying at least 13,500 New Jersey people who had registered with organizers, were leaving simultaneously from various other locations in New Jersey. BCS marchers included Jane Abraham, Carole Benson, Nancy Dweck and her daughter Amy, and Joan Schnuer.

Carole Benson, NCJW BCS Past President, recalls: "Hurling down the NJ Turnpike bumper to bumper with hundreds of other buses converging on Washington, we arrived at 10:00 am at the huge RFK Stadium parking lot in DC. The DC Metro System was backed up with hour-long waits, so we walked on East Capitol Street with thousands of others for the two and a half miles to the Capitol, a journey that was uplifting and inspiring. Homeowners came out with their children and dogs to line the street to offer us goodies and accolades."

Jane Abraham, NCJW BCS Advocacy VP, said: "The unprecedentedly huge turnout made the original march route alongside the National Mall impassable, so we five rallied together with thousands of positive, peace-loving women, men, and kids displaying innovative banners and signs. With a feeling that history was being made, we stood by the Reflecting Pool by the Capitol steps, with the backdrop of the stand on which the Presidential Inauguration had taken place a mere 24 hours earlier. The atmosphere was upbeat throughout the day, but we sensed that the struggle was just starting. We felt the people power in the huge number of humanity surrounding us and were motivated and proud to be marching together."

Joan Schnuer, an active NCJW BCS member, remembers: "As the day drew to a close, we enjoyed a brief respite with our friends and

colleagues from DC and around the USA at NCJW's midtown Washington office. Nancy Kaufman, NCJW CEO, greeted us warmly with "You New Jersey women are amazing." We learned that countless other NCJW members had traveled to DC for the march.

The bus arrived back in Paramus around 11:00 pm, its passengers tired but elated. NCJW BCS members unable to get to Washington joined sister marches in many other USA locations, including NYC and the NJ State Capitol in Trenton.

Changes to NCJW BCS Bylaws

The Section's Board has been working to make itself more efficient and productive. During the last few months our board has approved the following changes. They have also been approved by our National office and our general membership at the January 17, 2017, meeting.

Article VIII, Section 5: The position of Corresponding Secretary will no longer be an elected officer and the position will be removed from the Executive Committee. It will be replaced with a board position of Social Correspondent, appointed by the Administration Vice President.

Article X: The term "Trustee" will be changed to "Director." This reflects the current terminology used by our National office. Our board will now be called the Board of Directors.

Article X, Section 2 : The current Section 2 will be deleted and replaced with the following: There shall be no fewer than ten Directors on the board and no more than the number required to fill the Chairs of the standing and major committees. Each Director must assume one of these chairmanships. The Chairmen will be selected by each Department Vice President.
