# NOVEMBER GENERAL MEETING LGBT EQUALITY: OUR WORK HAS JUST BEGUN

Every November NCJW BCS conducts a community-wide advocacy forum. The year's program will be "LGBT Equality: Our Work Has Just Begun." This meeting will take place on WEDNESDAY, November 9. Our distinguished presenters will discuss the gains made to protect LGBT individuals and what the community can do to help end discrimination and promote equal rights for LGBT individuals.

**Steven Goldstein** will deliver the keynote address. Goldstein, Executive Director of the Anne Frank Center for Mutual Respect, achieved national renown as the leader of Garden State Equality. From the time he founded the organization in 2004, it amassed 150,000 members and won a record-breaking 216 new civil rights laws at every level in the state. In 2013, Goldstein became an associate professor of law and political science at Rutgers University in Newark. He has been a television producer, a senior staff member in both houses of Congress, a lawyer for the U.S. House Judiciary Committee, and communications director for the late U.S. Senator Frank Lautenberg.

**State Senate Majority Leader Loretta Weinberg** will serve as moderator. She was elected to the NJ State Senate in November 2005 after serving in the Assembly for 14 years. Senator Weinberg is vice-chair of the Legislative Oversight Committee, the Joint Committee on Economic Justice and Equal Employment, and has been appointed to an ad hoc committee to review domestic violence and

the New Jersey court system. She also sits on numerous statewide commissions and has been at the forefront of LGBT advancement and anti-discrimination throughout her career.

**Assemblyman Tim Eustace**, panel member, served as Mayor of Maywood (2008-12) and currently represents District 38. He was the first openly gay person elected to the NJ legislature as a non-incumbent; he is co-chair of the NJ Legislative LGBT Caucus and vice-chair of the Health and Senior Services Committee.

**Jane Clementi**, panel member, is a registered nurse and mother of Tyler Clementi. She is the founder and a board member of the Tyler Clementi Foundation who works to end bullying in schools, workplaces, and faith communities and speaks in support of LGBT rights and the need for families and communities to embrace their LGBT populations.

**Hetty Rosenstein**, panel member, is the NJ State Director of the Communications Workers of America, the largest union representing state workers. Rosenstein represents more than 70,000 working families, including more than 40,000 state workers, 15,000 county and local workers, and thousands of workers in the telecommunications and direct-care industries. She is a strong and vocal advocate for employee rights and LGBT rights and equality.

# THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 3-SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 6: TEANECK INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL

Activism: Making Change remains the theme of the festival that has put Teaneck on the map. The four days will include independent features, documentaries, and shorts that inspire discussion, debate, and the desire to do something to make a difference. Saturday night's Centerpiece Event, at Temple Emeth, will include the feature film Sold, about human trafficking. It is sponsored by Wise Older Women (WOW), which is honoring NJ Assemblywoman Valerie Huttle (an NCJW life member), who will participate in a talkback.

This year NCJW BCS has joined TIFF as a partner and, with State Senator Loretta Weinberg (an NCJW life member), will sponsor an important film: Robert Greenwald's new documentary, *Making a Killing: Guns, Greed, & the NRA*. Senator Weinberg will participate in a panel discussion following the screening. The film will be shown on Sunday, November 6.

# TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 22: FRAIDY REISS: UNCHAINED AT LAST

Did you know that child marriages are legal in the United States and that thousands of children as young as twelve have been wed? Speaker for our second study group, Fraidy Reiss, has experienced this situation first hand. When she was only nineteen, her family arranged for her to marry a man who turned out to be extremely violent. With no education or job and living in an insular religious community where only men have the right to grant a divorce, Fraidy felt totally trapped.



Her story is one of personal survival. She has gone on to establish and lead a nonprofit organization, **Unchained at Last**, a group dedicated to helping women leave or avoid arranged or forced marriages and rebuild their lives. Come hear Fraidy tell her story and how she now helps others.

# JUDICIAL NOMINATIONS CAMPAIGN – ACTION NEEDED

The federal courts determine how justice is delivered and affect nearly every aspect of our lives. There are now an unprecedented number of federal vacancies in addition to the vacant Supreme Court seat. Our federal courts do not have enough judges to hear all the pending cases.

There are three federal judiciary vacancies in New Jersey; one of these is designated a "judicial emergency." There are two empty seats on the New Jersey District Court and two on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 3rd Circuit, which includes New Jersey, Delaware, and Pennsylvania.

This is a great opportunity to contact our senators. Urge them to hold hearings and votes on pending judicial nominees and inquire about the status of identifying nominees for the remaining vacancies. Tell our senators that justice delayed is justice denied!

## **ADVOCACY/EDUCATION - A PRIMER**

This is what we do in Advocacy/Education: We study, we research and then we educate our members and the community so that they can be well-informed and thus able to advocate on issues that affect women and children and families. We raise our voices individually and as a group for issues that affect the most vulnerable. We write letters to the editor and to our legislators, we sign petitions, we fax, we email, we phone, we lobby our legislators, we post on social media. We urge our members and our community leaders to advocate our legislators for the important issues.

In good conscience, we can never be a one-issue organization. There are so many compelling issues that are worthy of our attention and need our voice. Can we say that gun violence is less important than the immigration issue? And are we able to ignore human trafficking when so many runaway and homeless young people are vulnerable to labor and sex trafficking?

Should we not demand that our senators fulfill their constitutional responsibility and act on nominee Merrick

Garland? And how do we overlook the fact that most states do not have laws protecting the LGBT community from discriminatory practices? How can we not acknowledge those suffering from homelessness and hunger? How can we not react vehemently to the cuts made in child nutrition programs for families who rely on government help to feed their children; do we not beg, no – demand – our legislators to pass social justice bills to provide for these children? How can we NOT take notice of what is happening in many states in our country to restrict a woman's right to an abortion?
