

## SEPTEMBER GENERAL MEETING POLITICS AND THE MEDIA: JIM AXELROD

At the September 20 general meeting, we'll hear Jim Axelrod, Senior National Correspondent for CBS News, discuss a very timely topic in this election year: Politics and the Media: The Gap between Politicians and Real Leadership. At CBS, Jim has covered a broad range of domestic and international stories, such as the American invasion of Afghanistan and the war and refugee crisis in the Balkans. In 2003, Axelrod was the first television journalist to report live from Baghdad's Saddam International Airport after it fell to U.S. troops. His live coverage of the U.S. Army was the first to be broadcast by a reporter embedded with ground troops.

He also represented CBS News in 2010 when foreign reporters were invited to North Korea for a rare glimpse at that country's leadership and culture. Axelrod was a member of the team honored with an Emmy award in 2014 for a "48 Hours" special on the manhunt and capture of the Boston Marathon bombing suspects. He was a member of the team honored with a 2010 duPont-Columbia Silver Baton for "CBS Reports: Children of the Recession," the extraordinary multi-

#### TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 27: STUDY GROUP: GUN VIOLENCE—A MOTHER'S STORY

As NCJW is focusing on the issue of gun violence, our first study group could not be more timely. Our speaker will be Lois A. Schaffer, who is not only a strong advocate in this area, but has experienced first-hand the incredible hardship and pain of losing a child to gun violence.

In 2013, Lois Schaffer published a book, *The Unthinkable: Life, Loss, and a Mother's Mission to Ban Illegal Guns*. Author and educator Arthur Kurzwell said about her book: "I wish this book would be irrelevant. I wish this book would be unnecessary. But *The Unthinkable* is alarmingly relevant and desperately necessary." Mrs. Shaffer will share her experiences as an

platform series about the recession's devastating effects on children. He was also one of the CBS News correspondents who received a 2002 Emmy Award for the "CBS Evening News" coverage of the Washington DC sniper siege.

Axelrod joined CBS News in 1996 as a Miami-based correspondent and later served in the Dallas and New York Bureaus. He also served as CBS News Chief White House Correspondent from 2006 to 2009. Before joining CBS News, he was a political reporter at WRAL-TV in Raleigh, NC, a reporter and producer for WSTM-TV Syracuse, NY, and anchor and reporter at WUTR-TV Utica, NY. He began his career at WVII-TV Bangor, Maine, in 1989. Born in New Brunswick NJ, Axelrod was graduated from Cornell University in 1985 with a BA in history and from Brown University in 1989 with an MA in history. He is the author of *In The Long Run: A Father, A Son, And Unintentional Lessons in Happiness*, published in 2011. He and his wife, Christina, live in Montclair, NJ, with their three children.

July 10, 2016: Goldie Michelson, 113, former NCJW activist and oldest person in the United States, has passed away. Born in Russia in 1903, she settled in Worcester, MA, with her family at age 2. A member of NCJW Worcester section, she spent her life dedicated to academia and studying the Jewish immigrant experience in America.

Aida was born in Cuba after her parents emigrated there from Russia, and spoke only Yiddish until she went to school. She was always interested in numbers and helped her father in his business while she was in high school. After earning her degree in accounting from the University of Havana, she worked as an accountant.

Aida married in 1960 and emigrated to the United States, settling first in Brooklyn and then in Fair Lawn. She then ran two stores with her husband. She joined the Jersey Hills Section of NCJW in 1974 and served as its president for several years.

When Aida moved to Fort Lee, she became active in the Bergen County Section and quickly assumed the role of Treasurer of the Thrift Shop, a job at which she works very energetically and efficiently, saving the section money by carefully scrutinizing every bill. She is an invaluable volunteer.

## **VOLUNTEERS - A GIFT TO AND THE HEART OF OUR APHASIA COMMUNITY**

Imagine...you find yourself in a foreign country where you don't understand the language, much less speak it. You know what you want to say, your thoughts are there, but the words don't come. Nor can you write these words on paper. You hear words being spoken to you, but they make no sense.

What you have just imagined is what life is like for someone with *aphasia... a communication disorder that is the result of a stroke or a traumatic brain injury.* A person with aphasia retains their intelligence, but can have difficulty with understanding spoken language, reading or writing, or experience difficulties with all of these. This communication disorder affects 40% of all stroke and brain trauma survivors.

The Adler Aphasia Center, a nonprofit organization based in Maywood and West Orange, NJ, is an innovative post-rehabilitative therapeutic program that addresses the long-term needs of people with aphasia and their families. It is the only center of its kind in NJ, an area with an estimated 70,000 people diagnosed with aphasia, and is considered the world leader and gold standard in long-term, post-rehab community-based care for people with this disorder. Almost 2,000,000 people have been diagnosed with aphasia in the U.S.

Everyone has a talent and some time to share. At Adler Aphasia Center, we value those talents and time and encourage volunteering with our Center. Our Center currently has 90+ volunteers and is looking for more as we expand our programming and continue to grow. We ask for a commitment of just one hour a week for a full semester (15 weeks). We provide introductory and ongoing communication strategy training for all volunteers. The Center's volunteer needs are:

 Communication Partners – Volunteers work one-on-one with Center members, or in groups to assist group leaders and members in a wide variety of activities designed to enhance the communication skills and psychosocial well-being of our members, including art, *Something Special* (jewelry and gift design), cooking, games, and more.

- Communication-Technology Partners Volunteers must be generally familiar with computers and iPads and able to assist others in using software programs or software applications (Apps).
- Technology based groups -- Members participate in technology groups with volunteer assistance <u>as needed</u>. Volunteers are asked to give members a chance before helping out. We offer different Technology Group Levels based on the member's skills.
