ARMCHAIR ADVOCACY

To all of our Armchair Travelers and Couch Potatoes and anyone else who cares about what is happening in our state and in our country: For many of us, getting to meetings, traveling long distances to rallies or marching with picket signs are not options. But there are ways that we can still make our voices heard from the comfort of our homes. All you need is a telephone, a computer, or pen and paper. There are many issues that we all care about. Each day our legislators ask their staff how many constituents have contacted them and about which issues. They know these constituents are the ones who care about the issues and who vote.

When there is an issue about which you are concerned or which impacts the lives of women, children and families, let your legislators know. Call, email, or write a letter. Tell them that you care. Tell them that you want to see a particular bill or issue become a law or that you are displeased about an action that they have taken. Read our email alerts. Or read your newspaper, and make that call. The names and contacts of our legislators, both federal and local, are listed on the reverse of the board list enclosed in the September- October bulletin. Keep the sheet close at hand, and take action. One small act can help change the world.
