

COMING EVENTS

TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 19, GENERAL MEETING TO FEATURE "HUMAN TRAFFICKING – MODERN-DAY SLAVERY IN BERGEN COUNTY"

The Super Bowl, an event that attracts thousands of sports enthusiasts, is coming to MetLife Stadium in the Meadowlands in February 2014. For the past two years New Jersey has been working with representatives of multiple organizations and law enforcement agencies in the state to develop anti-trafficking strategies to thwart traffickers who take advantage of large sports events to prey upon the most vulnerable in our communities.

On Tuesday, November 19 our General meeting will feature a program titled "HUMAN TRAFFICKING/MODERN-DAY SLAVERY" which will include an outstanding panel of experts in the field:

Moderator: *Assemblywoman Valerie Vainieri*, author and prime Sponsor of the Human Trafficking Prevention, Protection and Treatment Act.

Agent Keyla Munoz, Victim Specialist, Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Lesley Frost, New Jersey Coalition Against Human Trafficking.

Lauren Hersh, New York Director, Equality Now.

In New Jersey this year, there have been several arrests of traffickers who brought Mexican women into the U.S. illegally with the promise of house cleaning and babysitting jobs. Instead, they were forced into prostitution. Other trafficked women have been found working in massage parlors. During the summer the FBI announced the largest sex trafficking crackdown in U.S. history which resulted in the rescue of 105 children and the arrest of 150 pimps across the country. The FBI stated that "awareness is the top priority in tracking down traffickers."

Bergen County Section is partnering with the New Jersey Coalition Against Human Trafficking and the Polaris Project, an organization dedicated to preventing trafficking, to raise awareness in our community of this heinous crime. "Your NCJW BCS meeting on human trafficking is strategic to the whole state," said Melanie Roth Gorelick of Jewish Federation of Greater Metro West and Communications Director of the NJ Coalition Against Human Trafficking.

You won't want to miss this general meeting which is open to the public at no charge.

TRIP: THE JEWISH MUSEUM, NEW YORK CITY EXHIBIT "CHAGALL: LOVE, WAR AND EXILE"

We will visit the museum, guided by a docent, for the much anticipated exhibit of Chagall's works of the 1930's and 40's, never previously shown in the U.S. These works are very different from those with which we have become familiar in more recent times, reflecting the artist's reactions to his exile from his native land, second exile from Paris to the United States, and to the exigencies of war. There will be sufficient time and opportunity to visit other exhibits, especially the work of Art Spiegelman "Co-mix: A Retrospective."

A catered, multi-course, gourmet luncheon in a private room at the museum will follow the exhibit tours.

On September 25, the Swim-In Program, a community service project for people with multiple sclerosis, co-sponsored by National Council of Jewish Women Bergen County Section and the NJ Metro Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, began its 38th year of providing free, supervised physical activity and the camaraderie of a caring community for people with MS. Laughter was the order of the day in the beautiful, newly renovated, Kaplan Jewish Community Center on the Palisades in Tenafly. Water activity is beneficial for people who have Multiple Sclerosis. Although their limbs may become weakened, the buoyancy of the water permits body movement which may otherwise be difficult. Each swimmer has his/her own trained volunteer in the water. Other volunteers help with wheel-chairs and in the locker room. The social and exercise aspects of our unique, two hour, Wednesday afternoon community service are rewarding to all.

This year, the opening days have been bitter-sweet for program participants and volunteers (many who have been with the program for decades). Our founder, and physical therapist extraordinaire, Ruth Cowan, has relocated to Texas to be closer to her family. ADVOCACY

IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF MARTIN LUTHER KING JR.

The last week of August Nancy Kaufman, NCJW CEO, and Sammie Moshenberg, Director of our Washington office, had the distinct honor of representing NCJW for the celebration at the White House the evening before the march and at the Lincoln Memorial for the 50-year commemoration of that historic day in August 1963 when Martin Luther King gave his "I have a dream" speech. Here are some of Nancy's remarks from this exciting event:

"The President may have been just two years old on that day but I was 12 years old and still remember how badly I wanted to be there for that event and for the freedom rides before and after! It was an honor for me to chat with MLK III at the White House on Tuesday evening and Susannah Heschel, (the children of two of

my heroes from those years) and to be one of a very few Jewish leaders who were invited to be part of the celebration.

"There are two takeaways I want to share with you as a result of this experience. The first is an acknowledgement of how far we have come since the 60s in terms of racial equality and women's rights and the second is how far we have yet to go to achieve the economic equality for minorities and women that Dr. King challenged us to strive for in his "I have a dream" speech.

"I am so proud to be leading an organization (NCJW) that was there then and is here now to fight for racial and economic justice for all. We cannot and will not rest until the dreams we all have are realized and we can fulfill the hope and promise of those who have gone before us and who dedicated their lives to making this world a better place for all people."

ADVOCACY IN ACTION

As you probably know, NCJW is an organization of *ADVOCACY, COMMUNITY SERVICE, EDUCATION AND PHILANTHROPY.*

I'd like to tell you one quick story of committed advocacy concerning Sammie Moshenberg, the director of NCJW's Washington office. One day in late September Sammie was arrested on the Capitol grounds in an act of civil disobedience with 119 other women demonstrating for immigration reform. They linked arms, marched, sat down, blocked traffic, chanted and sang. And then the paddy wagons came. The group was detained by police well into the evening and their stories were captured by the Washington Post and by Rachel Maddow on MSNBC. Sammie's picture, along with the story, were even in the Bergen Record. Now THAT is advocacy in action.

By the way, Sammie will be the speaker at our general meeting in April. You won't want to miss that! – *Ann Levenstein*


