“RENAISSANCE WOMAN” TO SPEAK AT GENERAL MEETING

We are delighted to welcome internationally renowned flutist Eugenia Zukerman as speaker at our May meeting. Miss Zukerman will also perform well-loved pieces from her repertoire. A True Renaissance Woman, Miss Zukerman maintains an international concert calendar, while pursuing a multifaceted career that includes distinguished work as an arts administrator, author, educator, Internet entrepreneur, and journalist.

In demand from New York to China as an orchestral soloist, chamber musician and recitalist, Miss Zukerman has collaborated with such luminaries as Emanuel Ax, Yo-Yo Ma, and James Galway. She has performed with many of the world's finest orchestras. Miss Zukerman spent thirteen years as Artistic Director of the Bravo! Vail Valley Music Festival, which developed an international profile through annual residencies of the New York Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Orchestra, Yo-Yo Ma, and Lang-Lang.

Recognized with an Emmy nomination as an important broadcast journalist, Miss Zukerman was an Arts Correspondent for CBS Sunday Morning. She has also appeared on NBC's Today

Show, CBS's Morning Show, The Charlie Rose Show, and numerous PBS specials. She founded ClassicalGenie, an Internet company that provides video content to music schools, artists, managers, and orchestras for use on their websites. She is the author of several books, including an award-winning nonfiction book *In My Mother's Closet*, and two novels, *Deceptive Cadence* and *Taking the Heat*.

Miss Zukerman supports causes such as Classical Action; Performing Arts against AIDS. She is a Young Concert Artists award-winning flutist, and received their Lifetime Honor Award in 2006. Other awards include a Lifetime Achievement Award from The Open University of Israel in NYC, a Woman of Achievement Award from the National Hadassah Organization, and the Exceptional Achievement Award from The Women's Project. She received a B.M. from The Juilliard School and an Honorary Doctorate from Knox College in Illinois, and is an adjunct faculty member at New York University's Steinhardt School of Music. A Massachusetts native, Miss Zukerman makes her home in New York City and in upstate New York.

We are pleased to present Shari Eshet, director of NCJW's Israel office based in Jerusalem. Eshet is the heart and soul of NCJW's Israel program.

In addition to representing NCJW at the Women Studies Forum at Tel Aviv University and the NCJW Research Institute for Innovation in Education at

Hebrew University (RIFIE), Eshet administers NCJW's Granting Program, which supports eight grassroots organizations that address women's rights and gender equality in Israel. This past summer our section answered the call to contribute to an emergency grant fund, also administered by Eshet, to help provide a three-night "respite retreat" for survivors of domestic violence and their children and a three-week evacuation for at-risk girls living just a mile from Gaza.

AWARDS

HANNAH G. SOLOMON AWARD – ELAINE K. MEYERSON



Elaine K. Meyerson, LSW, ACSW, DVS, currently serves as the Executive Director of Center For Hope And Safety (formerly Shelter Our Sisters), a leading Bergen County, New Jersey, nonprofit agency providing confidential emergency shelter and support services for victims of domestic violence. A licensed social worker, Meyerson has been at the Center for almost 29 years.

In this capacity she has grown the agency from a small grassroots organization to an integral and well-respected county-wide program benefiting Bergen County residents. Elaine is responsible for both the fiscal and administrative management of the organization, which today has an annual operating budget of approximately \$3 million and a staff of 50 employees and over 100 volunteers. Her key duties include the oversight of a 24-hour hotline; emergency shelter; five transitional housing units (two owned by the agency); and the new 10,000-square-foot Community Service Center. Overall services include case management, job readiness training, bilingual support, counseling, and residential children's services. Community service programs include a community-based creative arts therapy program for children; follow-up services; community education--training and consulting; and the agency's newest program, Outreach and Multicultural Services.

Elaine is active on many human service committees and coalitions. She is presently on Bergen County's Continuum of Care (housing) Committee, is an appointed member of the Hillsdale Board of Health, and is a Hillsdale Democratic Committee person. She most recently served on the Human Services Transition Team for the newly-elected Bergen County Executive, Jim Tedesco.

Elaine has served as President of the NJ State Coalition of Battered Women (2006-2008) and remains an active Board member. She was a former chairperson and member of Bergen County's Human Services Advisory Committee, chair of the county's homeless (CEAS) committee, and has served on advisory boards of Project SARAH, Bergen Community College, Hackensack University Medical Center (Loving Arms program), and Ramapo College's Social Work Program. Elaine is a former chair of the sisterhood and chair of the Rabbi search committee of Temple Beth Sholom in Park Ridge. She is a life member of NCJW Bergen County Section.

A noted speaker, former adjunct professor, and award recipient, Elaine Meyerson is a graduate of SUNY Buffalo, where she received both a Masters of Social Work (MSW) and a Bachelors in Psychology and Sociology. She also holds certifications from the Academy of Certified Social Workers (ACSW) and is a Domestic Violence Specialist (DVS).

She has been married for 39 years to Lawrence N. Meyerson, a Hillsdale Councilman and noted attorney who practices in Montvale. They have two adult children, Rachel and David and a daughter-in-law Elizabeth.



WOMAN OF THE SECTION: MARIAN KUGELMASS

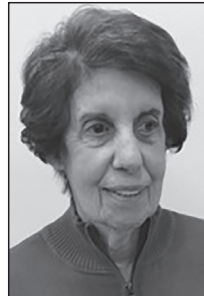
I was born and raised in the Bronx, New York and attended Bronx High School of Science and Hunter College campus in the Bronx. I taught science and math in junior high school, met my husband, Arthur, a fellow Bronxite and teacher, married in 1959 and started married life in the Bronx. With three children, two sons and a daughter,

we moved to New Jersey on February 19, 1968, and I attended an NCJW evening branch meeting two weeks later. We joined Congregation Beth Sholom, Teaneck, shortly thereafter. That began our family's long association with both Beth Sholom and NCJW. I became a life member in the early 70s.

During my children's elementary grades I remained a stay-at-home mom, while teaching adult education classes in dressmaking in the Teaneck Adult Education program and volunteering in the Whittier School. In 1974 I returned to teaching full time. In 1982, I became a student once again, earning my Master's in Education in Supervision and Administration with additional credits in School Business Administration at William Paterson College. Degree in hand, I became an assistant principal, then principal in a small out-of-district special education school for severely emotional disturbed students.

In 1987, I was hired by the Archdiocese of Newark as principal of one of their special needs schools. I became the superintendant of all the schools. In 1996 I opened a preschool handicapped program and later a high school with vocational training. After thirteen years as Director of Special Education with the Archdiocese, I retired in 2000.

Did you know...

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

- Women are much more likely to be victims of intimate partner violence: 85% of domestic abuse victims are women.
- 1 in 4 women, and 1 in 7 men, will be victims of severe violence by an intimate partner in their lifetimes.
- The number of American troops killed in Afghanistan and Iraq between 2001 and 2012 was 6,488. The number of American women murdered by current or ex male partners during that time was 11,766, nearly double the amount of war casualties.

- Domestic violence is the third leading cause of homelessness among families in the United States.
- 10 million children are exposed to domestic violence annually.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING

- Human trafficking is a 150 billion-dollar industry, a number that has tripled over the last three years.
- Human trafficking is the second most profitable criminal network, behind only the drug cartels.
- Children make up one third of trafficking victims worldwide.
- Trafficking is happening everywhere; no part of the world is untouched by this crime.
- In the United States, most labor trafficking victims are foreign nationals,

while most sex trafficking victims are US citizens.

- 119 human trafficking cases were reported in the state of New Jersey in 2014.

RAPE

- 44% of rape victims are under 18; 80% are under 30.
- Only 60% of sexual assaults are reported to the police.
- Only 3% of rapists ever spend a day in jail.
- Approximately two thirds of sexual assaults are committed by someone known to the victim.
