COUNCIL MEMBERS VISIT BERGEN VOLUNTEER MEDICAL INITIATIVE

In late September NCJW members Sue Kanrich, Peggy Kabakow and Gladys Laden visited the new site location for BVMI (Bergen Volunteer Medical Initiative) on Essex Street in Hackensack. Amanda Missey, President/CEO, met with the Council members prior to touring the facility and discussed how the improvements will benefit the patients. It's a beautiful facility and an amazing accomplishment. It has already experienced a 10% increase in the number of patients served and plans are underway to expand hours.

BVMI provides free primary, sick and chronic care to low-income working Bergen County residents who do not have medical insurance. Individuals/families may earn up to 300 percent of the federal poverty level. NCJW BCS was part of the founding group in 2006 when efforts began to create this free healthcare facility for the working poor. Doors opened in 2009, and the 8th year anniversary was celebrated in September. BVMI continues to be one of NCJW's outstanding community services.

FROM THE CO-PRESIDENTS

By the time our members read this article, the days will be shorter, the nights cooler and the holidays over. The beautiful days of Indian summer will be long gone; geraniums replaced by mums, and Thanksgiving and Hanukkah decorations will be filling store aisles. As the leaves fall around us, there is one week in September that is especially worth noting, and though the specific events may be "old news" come early November, what they represent exemplifies the spirit and activities of NCJW BCS.

At our monthly Board meeting on Tuesday, September 12, we proudly passed the 2017-2018 budget. Loud applause accompanied the vote, because, due to the generosity of our members and the success of the Thrift Shop, we were able to increase our allocations to the vital community

services we support. Each of them is struggling under the weight of decreased government allocations and increased need; it felt good to know that the women of NCJW were able to fill even a small part of the gap. If even a few more people can get utility assistance from Center for Food Action, or one or two more children can attend camp next summer, we can feel good.

Your Stay-At-Home invitation has doubtless hit your mailbox; we hope you will give generously to honor Bergen County Section's 95th Birthday and help continue to support our work.

At the back of the room where the Board meeting was held, a table was stacked high with donations of underwear and socks to be shipped to victims of Hurricane Harvey. Council women chipped in yet again.

That same Tuesday evening, several section members joined NCJW women from across the country for an informative and troubling call on reproductive justice, one of our advocacy issues. Lead by National president

Beatrice Kahn and attorney and advocate Stephanie Toti, we learned how Courts Matter to Reproductive Health, Rights and Justice. There will be work to do; let us know if this is a topic of interest. NCJW BCS is a proud sponsor of "Birthright: A War Story" at the Teaneck Film Festival on Sunday, November 5. Join us there to explore the challenges faced by too many women across the United States.

And Wednesday, September 13 found 15 of us on the Green in Hackensack, hanging T-shirts and listening to poignant stories about sexual abuse and domestic violence. Assemblywoman Valerie Huttle spoke about founding the Clothesline Project nearly 20 years ago; NCJW BCS was there then and continues to work with community partners to keep the topic in the forefront. Our November 21 yearly

Advocacy Forum will address Sexual Violence: Changing the Culture. We hope you will be there to #letsstarttheconversation.

Kenneth Jacobson from the ADL spoke eloquently on *Resurgent Anti-Semitism* on Thursday, September 14. His talk informed and stimulated the large crowd. What we are currently seeing and hearing, he said, is classic right-wing anti-Semitism. The rhetoric, though, has been emboldened by the current climate of public acting out. Yes, we should worry, but more important we need to remain vigilant and act when we see injustice.

The activities mentioned above represent only a small part of the myriad of opportunities available to NCJW BCS members. Whether your passion is community service, advocacy or broadening your mind through General Meetings, Study Groups, trips or symphony, we want to see you and hear from you. During times of national/international disasters, the question usually arises about donating clothing, shoes, and household goods from Council Thrift Shop. Unless the tragedy occurs locally, like the fire in the Edgewater Avalon apartments in 2015 that displaced over 500 residents, donating bulky, heavy physical items to one central location for distribution to the needy is impractical.

For starters, shipping clothing in bulk containers is expensive and time-consuming. After earthquakes and hurricanes – where buildings have been damaged or destroyed, transportation is difficult, if not impossible, and utility problems prevail – manpower to sort and distribute items is in short supply and urgently needed elsewhere. Emergency items usually shipped in bulk include water,

food, and diapers, and often military transport is used to reach disaster-stricken areas.

Most disaster relief organizations like the International Red Cross, JDC, and local Federations suggest that donations of money do the most good. These contributions put your resources and funds to the most effective use. Our collective need to want to help out during disasters is only human. But time, money and distance limit our good intentions.
