MARCH GENERAL MEETING GUN SAFETY: "ORANGE RIBBONS FOR JAIME"

NCJW BCS is pleased to present Fred Guttenberg as our speaker at the **March 24 General Meeting at 12:30 pm at Temple Emeth in Teaneck**. Mr. Guttenberg is the father of 14-year-old Jaime Guttenberg, who was murdered in the Parkland School shooting on February 14, 2018. The day after the murder, Mr. Guttenberg spoke at a public vigil in Parkland. His words shook the nation, and he has not stopped speaking since.

Only four months prior to the murder of his daughter, his brother Michael had passed away from cancer related to his service in the aftermath of 9/11. He was one of the original first responders and was with a team of physicians who became trapped in the WTC as it collapsed. Amazingly, the room that they hid in did not collapse, and Michael and his team spent 16 days at Ground Zero taking care of others.

Following Mr. Guttenberg's involvement in these two distinctly American tragedies, he traveled the country talking about both events. He discussed perspective, perseverance and resilience and how we should respond to those pivotal moments in our lives.

Mr. Guttenberg's professional life included over a decade of experience in sales and management with Johnson and Johnson, followed by 15 years as an entrepreneur, building a business that consisted of 19 Dunkin' Donuts franchises, which he sold in 2016.

Mr. Guttenberg and his wife Jennifer now spend time challenging our elected officials to do more. They began a nonprofit organization dedicated to Jaime's life called "Orange Ribbons for Jaime." He has been a regular on TV news programs and in a myriad of online and print media. "Orange Ribbons for Jaime" is now his full-time mission.

APRIL GENERAL MEETING: ANNUAL ADVOCACY FORUM YOUR VOTE, YOUR VOICE, YOUR POWER

VICTORIA BASSETTI, a fellow of the Brennan Center for Justice at NYU School of Law, will be the speaker at the **NCJW BCS Annual Advocacy Forum on Tuesday, April 21 at 12:30 pm at Temple Emeth in Teaneck**. She is the author of *Electoral Dysfunction: A Survival Manual for American Voters*, the companion book to a PBS documentary by the same name. Ms. Bassetti will give us insights into the issues, paradoxes and conflicts that inform our democracy and our voting.

Ms. Bassetti worked on Capitol Hill for almost a decade and served as chief counsel to Senator Dick Durbin (D-IL) and legislative director for former Senator John Edwards (D-NC). She was a chief counsel and staff director of a subcommittee of the Senate Judiciary Committee, and she served on the teams that drafted the 9/11 Victims' Compensation Fund Act, the PATRIOT Act, the Economic Espionage Act and the Homeland Security Act. She also oversaw matters related to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF).

While on Capitol Hill, Ms. Bassetti led a multi-year, multi-hearing, bipartisan investigation into innovation and competition in the medical device field, culminating in the first-ever voluntary code of conduct agreed to by hospital device purchasing organizations. The code was heralded by *The New York Times* as "sweeping" and aimed at "making it easier for new, lifesaving medical products to reach hospitals faster." In addition, she was a part of the legal working group assigned to oversee the Senate impeachment trial of President Bill Clinton.

NCJW CONVENTION 2020

This year, 127 years after Hannah G. Solomon founded NCJW in Chicago at the 1893 World's Fair, advocates from across the country will once again join together in Chicago on April 23–25 to celebrate all that NCJW has accomplished and set the course for the future. The theme for the convention will be "Jewish Feminism: Honoring the Past, Shaping the Future." Bergen County Section will be represented by six delegates selected by the Nominating Committee and approved by the Board. They are Joan Cooper, Elizabeth Halverstam, Elaine Meyerson, Bari-Lynne Schwartz, Linda Walden and Ginny Wasserman.

CHARLOTTE BENNETT SCHOEN TO RECEIVE NCJW's PRESTIGIOUS HANNAH G. SOLOMON AWARD



For decades, Charlotte Bennett Schoen has worked as an advocate to change the global culture of violence. In the 1970's, as an Englewood Board of Health and League of Women Voters member, she was appointed by the mayor to establish and coordinate mental health services in Englewood, Teaneck, Leonia and Englewood Cliffs. The coordination of these vital services has expanded and exists to this day.

In the early 90's she was employed by the Bergen County Department of Human

Services as Coordinator of the Community Court Watch Projects, organizing volunteers countywide to observe and report courtroom etiquette and responses of judges. The Court Watch II report was published and was part of the national wave of positive change regarding domestic violence laws. Charlotte was honored by the Bergen County Commission on the Status of Women and the State of NJ for her efforts (and the report is still available today). Charlotte also designed the Court Accompaniment Program at Alternatives to Domestic Violence (ADV) and administered it for 14 years. It still exists today.

A long-time elected member of the Englewood Democratic Municipal Committee, Charlotte was elected to two terms on the Englewood City Council (2005 through 2010) and served as City Council President in 2007.

In 2011 she embraced the concept of Global Justice Advocacy and worked for 3-month periods at NGOs in southeast Asia, serving until 2014, in Lucknow,

India; Chiang Mai, Thailand; and Yangon, Burma (Myanmar). She worked in the areas of education (training village women to keep girls in school); human rights; healthcare and education for sex workers; and peace-building programs. She employed her diversity of skills as she worked with the staff at SMILE (Smile Education and Development Foundation) and presented original peace projects in the cities of Yangon, Bago and Mandalay. Charlotte continues to collaborate with her Burmese colleagues on peace-building projects. A related exhibit was shown in 2018 at the Kaplen JCC in Tenafly, and she was featured on the front page of the Jewish Standard – Call for Justice (9/21/18).

Locally Charlotte also serves as co-president of the Englewood Historical Society, where its advocacy has been expanded and successful city-wide programs have been developed. She is a member of the Englewood Rotary Club and served as District 7490 Chair of Peace and Conflict Resolution 2013-16.

Since 2016 Charlotte has focused on advocacy and justice for immigrants who have come to the US for political asylum. In 2014 she attended a NCJW program that presented First Friends of NJ NY, a 20-year-old NGO whose mission is to "uphold the inherent dignity and humanity of detained immigrants and asylum seekers." She is now a Board member and Development Chair of First Friends, making visits to people in detention and mentoring new volunteers.

Since 2009, Charlotte has been a life member of NCJW and served on the Board of Project S.A.R.A.H. which also honored her in 2010. Charlotte has two daughters, Lindsay Mara and Ava Lauren, both of whom are attorneys. This award will be presented to Charlotte at the **NCJW BCS Annual Spring Luncheon on June 3**.

WOMAN OF THE SECTION: Henrietta Wolfeiler



Henrietta Wolfeiler was educated totally within the borders of Los Angeles, where she attended elementary school through high school and then went on to UCLA where she studied Home Economics and Education, receiving her BA in 1958.

As Henrietta tells it, the normal chain of events at that time was education, then marriage. Since there was no such thing as J-Date, she met her future husband Bernie via a blind date and decided that

a man with a good sense of humor was in order. He seemed determined to find someone who was GU (geographically undesirable), as she was in LA and he was in New York. They figured out the cross-country issue – she moved to the East Coast in 1958.

Her first job was as a Home Economics teacher at Teaneck High School, living in River Edge. It was a serious adjustment with a new husband, new city and new job and few friends. A suggestion was made that she join an organization which had many young women members who were working

or were stay-at-home moms with young children. The organization, of course, was NCJW, which had an evening branch. The rest is history. Sixty years later she's still hooked.

She and Bernie later moved from River Edge to Teaneck and they became parents of three wonderful children. A career move brought Henrietta to the world of fashion, where she worked in the New York garment industry for almost 20 years. Leaving Teaneck for a Hackensack high-rise, ultimate retirement, enjoying her children and seven grandchildren has brought fulfillment and pleasure.

NCJW has become an important part of Henrietta's life. Her first Evening Branch job was as refreshment chair, perfect for a Home Economics major. But she has had many jobs over the years, ranging from chairing the Nominating Committee to most recently serving as the Waiting Room Volunteer Coordinator.

"Seeing my parents volunteer in spite of working six days a week has always been my inspiration," she said proudly. She certainly has followed in their footsteps! This award will be presented to Henrietta at the **NCJW BCS Annual Spring Luncheon on June 3**.


SPECIAL COUNCIL SHABBAT WITH TEMPLE SINAI

BARI-LYNNE SCHWARTZ NAMED FIRST RECIPIENT OF THE JANE ABRAHAM ADVOCACY AWARD



This new award was established to honor the memory of Jane Abraham, our inspirational Co-President who passed away in 2019. Jane made advocacy come alive in our Section through her passion and commitment to social justice. This award honors an NCJW BCS member who has been a leader and instrumental in advancing social change in the community.

To receive the award, the recipient must fulfill the following criteria: further the mission of NCJW; exemplify innovation, creativity and courage; serve as a role model in our Section and our community; and raise awareness of NCJW through pioneering efforts, mentoring and motivation of others. We will be pleased to present this award to Bari-Lynne Schwartz at the April General Meeting's Advocacy Forum on April 21, at 12:30 pm at Temple Emeth.

Bari-Lynne grew up in Fitchburg and Leominster, Massachusetts, mill towns 50 miles west of Boston. Her early life mostly centered around a small Jewish community. Her grandfather was a founding member of the synagogue, and she enjoyed many after-school activities at the Jewish Community Center.

Bari-Lynne graduated from the University of Massachusetts and taught high school English for five years. She then lived in London for six years. Returning to the US, she moved to New Jersey and immersed herself in volunteer activities. As a docent at the Montclair Historical Society and the Montclair Art Museum, she produced and coordinated participatory education programs for children. She

served on the State Public Affairs Committee of the Junior Leagues of New Jersey, advocating successfully for family life education and education for children with disabilities in the public schools.

In 1988 Bari-Lynne received a Master of Social Work degree. She served as the Planning Officer at the Bergen County Department of Human Services, where for 20 years she oversaw the grants/contract office and administered the Human Services Advisory Council (HSAC) and the Bergen County Commission on the Status of Women. She became a champion for social justice. She advocated and testified for policy and legislative reforms, coordinated successful legislative breakfasts and programs celebrating women's rights and much more. While there she met two articulate, powerful activists, Connie Hochberg and Bea Podorefsky, who were on the HSAC representing NCJW Bergen County Section.

After retiring, Bari-Lynne attended two of Bergen County Section's impressive advocacy forums and joined Council. Soon she was on the Board as a co-chair of the next forum. She is a co-chair of the Grants Oversight Committee, served two years as Co-Vice President of Advocacy and Education and currently is a Co-President.

Bari-Lynne lives in Little Falls. She has two children and two fabulous grandchildren!

When informed of her selection as the first recipient of the Jane Abraham Advocacy Award, Bari-Lynne said, "Educating others and championing social justice reform have been constants in my life. I am truly honored to be the first recipient of the Jane Abraham Advocacy Award. For three years Jane guided my Council activities, and I will always cherish her friendship and her passion."

IS SHARED HOUSING FOR YOU?

An 85-year-old woman wanted to stay in Bergen County, where she had lived her whole life, but could no longer afford it on her fixed income. With her housing search nearing a dead end, she sought help from the Shared Housing program, initiated by NCJW and presently run by the Women's Rights Information Center (WRIC) in Englewood, NJ.

The program director interviewed her and asked for references before recommending she share her home with a vetted Englewood woman who was struggling to keep up with her monthly bills. Despite a 20-year difference in their ages, the two women bonded quickly.

The Shared Housing program has long been the only non-profit in Bergen County to serve as a matchmaker between overburdened homeowners and home seekers, many of whom have as little as \$500 - \$700 a month to spend on housing.

The program, open to men and women of any age, helps prospective housemates identify and avoid potential conflicts by completing a detailed housing agreement together.

Homeowners can be reluctant to open their home to someone they don't know even if they are finding it difficult to get by on their own. Shared Housing staff will guide clients before and during the time they are living together.

So:

- 1. Would you like extra income?
- 2. Could you use help with household chores?
- 3. Would you enjoy congenial companionship?

SUFFERN MUSEUM HIGHLIGHTS HIDDEN HOLOCAUST HISTORY

On Thursday, May 14, 2020 NCJW BCS will travel to Rockland Community College in Suffern, NY to visit the redesigned and expanded Holocaust Museum & Center for Tolerance and Education. Abigail Miller, the museum's Holocaust Educator, will conduct a private guided tour of the exhibit "Holocaust by Bullets." The exhibit, based on the work of Father Patrick Desbois, a Roman Catholic priest from Paris, examines the history of the Holocaust in Eastern Europe before the opening of the concentration camps. This is a largely unknown chapter of the Holocaust that should be of interest as it accounts for at least 1/3 of the Holocaust victims. The exhibit details the process of uncovering and documenting the mass killing sites of these early phases of the Holocaust in Eastern Europe. The Jewish Book Council recognized Father Desbois's book Holocaust by Bullets: A Priest's Journey to Uncover the Truth Behind the Murder of 1.5 Million Jews as a National Jewish Book Award winner.

Following the tour, Ms. Miller will provide a special lecture to help us process the exhibit, to think critically about the earliest phases of the Holocaust and to inspire us to find our "unique personal responsibility to creating a more peaceful tomorrow." We will enjoy a buffet lunch in a private room at the museum. Lunch will include an assortment of sandwiches, salads, cookies, fruit and cold drinks.

The cost is \$70 for members and \$80 for non-members. Bus departs Temple Emeth, 1666 Windsor Road, Teaneck at 10:30 am sharp. Please arrive by 10:15 am. Bus returns approximately 3 pm.
