Ms. Bassetti also served on the teams that drafted the 9/11 Victims Compensation Fund, the PATRIOT Act, the Economic Espionage Act and the Homeland Security Act.

In addition, she was part of the legal working group assigned to oversee the Senate impeachment trial of President Bill Clinton in 2000.

STEPPING UP TO HELP FRONT-LINE WORKERS

Most everyone is familiar with the phrase "It takes a village" to protect our children. But now in these very difficult times, we can also say it takes a high-rise. In this case, the Parker Imperial apartment complex in North Bergen.

When Linda Walden, NCJW BCS board member and a resident at the complex, heard that YCS (Youth Consultation Service) needed masks for hundreds of front-line workers caring around the clock for children and young adults with special needs at their 36 group homes throughout New Jersey, she enlisted the help of her neighbors.

"I knew one of my neighbors was making masks in her apartment for others who needed them. So I asked her if she would be willing to make some masks for YCS," said Linda.

From there, the word started to spread. Another resident who was cleaning out her closets offered to donate table cloths and napkins; a man, who was an engineer, volunteered to cut out all the fabric and his wife washed all the material. With the help of another sewer who came on board, the group was able to present YCS with 400 masks.

It is so heartwarming for us to see how so many people can pull together to help others that they do not even know. Our staff is very grateful for these masks that are protecting them and the children they are caring for," said Ruthie Harper, YCS Chief Development Officer.

The group is not done vet! They are now responding to a call for masks from a toddler group in Hoboken.

Empty Seats, Stay-in-Place, and Social Distancing

While we wait patiently for the relaxing of restrictions, some of our agencies still need our assistance. Below are some of the things you can personally do from home to help them.

Bergen Family Center: Needs people to help make "comfort" calls - Contact Ina Miller-Silverstein at INAMS98@yahoo.com or 201-836-6562.

Center for Hope & Safety: For clients and staff: need 70 adult fabric masks; for children ages 3 - 6: need 10 masks; for children ages 6 – 12 need 10 masks. HIPPY (Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters) which trains parents to be their children's first teacher): volunteers are needed to video themselves either reading a children's story or doing a simple art project.
