# YOUR VOTE, YOUR VOICE, YOUR POWER

Victoria Bassetti, Brennan Center Fellow and expert on election matters, provides compelling historical background and hopeful perspectives.



On September 15 National Council of Jewish Women Bergen County Section Zoomed its Annual Advocacy Forum "Your Vote, Your Voice, Your Power." Representatives from over 30 partnering organizations joined NCJW BCS members in the Zoom gallery.

Victoria Bassetti gave a passionate, enlightening presentation that covered three topics: 1) Vote by Mail: the concerns of counting the massive volume this year. 2) The Electoral College: how there is uneven weight given from state to state and the new movement to circumvent the Electoral College by adopting the National Popular Vote Compact. 3) Gerrymandering: states will be redistricting soon

and this will affect the vote for the next ten years. Both parties have been guilty of gerrymandering to help the incumbent. It is crucial that there is non-partisan or independent oversight.

Ms. Bassetti felt that this election will be a cross between the 1876 election and the 1944 election: 1876, in that it will be highly contentious and could be dragged out for some time and 1944, in that there are massive efforts to enfranchise as many Americans as possible with Vote by Mail. She remains forever positive that the system of fair elections will prevail.

The meeting paid homage to the suffragists who came before us. With this being the  $100^{th}$  anniversary of women's suffrage, attendees were urged to honor their work by voting in this election and EVERY ELECTION.

Remember your first trip to buy school supplies? You were just entering Kindergarten, but everything on the shelves looked so grownup. It was very exciting. The Bergen Family Center and many members of NCJW BCS remembered those feelings on September 14 when they collected and distributed school supplies to HIPPY children.

Four Home Instructors service 75 families with 85 children. They normally meet once a week in the family's home. These instructors now drop off supplies, activity packets, story books, craft supplies and props to complete the activities. Their visits to the families are now virtual. This mammoth undertaking is done like a well-oiled machine.

### ADVOCACY MATTERS: Funding For School-Based Youth Services Programs Restored!

NCJW BCS and our members signed a petition and wrote letters urging Governor Murphy and the NJ State Legislature to restore funding for the critical School-Based Youth Services Programs. Our voices were heard!

Governor Murphy signed a budget that includes \$15 Million, full funding, for 100 programs statewide for the academic year. Over 2,000 Bergen County adolescents will receive services at three programs in our County: the Zone at Dwight Morrow High School in Englewood, The Drop-in Center at Hackensack High School and The Forum at Teaneck High School.

NCJW BCS thanks Governor Murphy and our District 37 Legislators, Senate Majority Leader Loretta Weinberg, Assemblywoman Valerie Vainieri Huttle, and Assemblyman Gordon Johnson for their support.

## **Englewood STRONG and COMMITTED**

Bergen Family Center extends our deepest appreciation to all of the legislators, community leaders, students, parents, advocates, and other stakeholders who advocated on our behalf to keep the doors of the ZONE open for DMHS & DMAE students and their families.
