Thursday, May 13, 11:00 AM Virtual Trip Russia in New York and Coney Island



RABBIS FOR REPRO

NCJW has a long history of advocating for reproductive freedom. It is a Jewish value. To enhance its advocacy, NCJW Inc. initiated Rabbis for Repro, asking rabbis, cantors and Jewish educators to sign a pledge to speak out for reproductive rights, health and justice. Over 1,000 have signed throughout the country, approximately 100 in NJ and 15 in Bergen County, including Rabbi Jordan Millstein and all the Temple Sinai clergy. Concurrently in New Jersey, Thrive NJ, a coalition of over 70 organizations, is advocating for the Reproductive Freedom Act (S3030/A4848), comprehensive ground-breaking NJ legislation, and has formed an Interfaith Council to which the clergy of Temple Sinai have also signed on. NCJW designated the weekend of February 12 and 13 as Shabbat Repro as an opportunity for congregations to learn about the importance of reproductive freedom.

On Friday, February 12, at Temple Sinai's Shabbat services, led by Rabbi Educator Beth Kramer-Mazer and Cantor Nitza Shamah, long time board member of both NCJW Bergen County Section and Temple Sinai **Peggy Kabakow** gave an overview of this important program and urged members to join with NCJW BCS to advocate for the Reproductive Freedom Act. NCJW BCS Co-President **Elizabeth Halverstam** lit the Shabbat candles.

Celebrating Our Community Services

MS Swim-In: Swim-In is a signature program of our Bergen County Section. It provides therapeutic water exercise for people with Multiple Sclerosis in the swimming pool at the Kaplen JCC on the Palisades in Tenafly, and is supervised by a licensed physical therapist. NCJW BCS volunteers assist clients in the pool, the locker room and with wheelchairs in the pool area.

In March 2020 when the program was halted due to the pandemic, NCJW BCS volunteers looked for new ways to stay in touch with the swimmers.

First was with weekly phone calls. Our 12 volunteers called the 20 swimmers to offer comfort and phone support. Although our MS clients expressed much gratitude for the phone calls, they really wanted to see each other, and we wanted to see them, too. So, we had informal Zoom gatherings throughout the summer and early fall. Then our long-time volunteer physical therapist (and NCJW Life Member) Ava Silverstein set up regular Zoom meetings for all swimmers and volunteers every other week, which are continuing in 2021. We have a chat session when clients bring up medical issues, share stories, and so forth. Then Ava directs half an hour of appropriate exercises. In addition to phone calls and Zoom meetings, our volunteers also sent holiday cards to our clients. We are all looking forward to the day when we can get back in the pool! CHARLOTTE BENNETT SCHOEN TO RECEIVE NCJW's PRESTIGIOUS HANNAH G. SOLOMON AWARD

For decades, Charlotte Bennett Schoen has worked as an advocate to change the global culture of violence. In the 1970's, as an Englewood Board of Health and League of Women Voters member, she was appointed by the mayor to establish and coordinate mental health services in Englewood, Teaneck, Leonia and Englewood Cliffs. The coordination of these vital services has expanded and exists to this day.

In the early 90's she was employed by the Bergen County Department of Human Services as Coordinator of the Community Court Watch Projects, organizing volunteers countywide to observe and report courtroom etiquette and responses of judges. The Court Watch II report was published and was part of the national wave of positive change regarding domestic violence laws. Charlotte was honored by the Bergen County Commission on the Status of Women and the State of NJ for her efforts (and the report is still available today). Charlotte also designed the Court Accompaniment Program at Alternatives to Domestic Violence (ADV) and administered it for 14 years. It still exists today.

A long-time elected member of the Englewood Democratic Municipal Committee, Charlotte was elected to two terms on the Englewood City Council (2005 through 2010) and served as City Council President in 2007.

In 2011 she embraced the concept of Global Justice Advocacy and worked for 3-month periods at NGOs in southeast Asia, serving until 2014, in Lucknow, India; Chiang Mai, Thailand; and Yangon, Burma (Myanmar). She worked in the areas of education (training village women to keep girls in school); human rights; healthcare and education for sex workers; and peace-building programs. She employed her diversity of skills as she worked with the staff at SMILE (Smile Education and Development Foundation) and presented original peace projects in the cities of Yangon, Bago and Mandalay. Charlotte continues to collaborate with her Burmese colleagues on peace-building projects. A related exhibit was shown in 2018 at the Kaplen JCC in Tenafly, and she was featured on the front page of the Jewish Standard – Call for Justice (9/21/18).

Locally Charlotte also serves on the Board of the Englewood Historical Society, where its advocacy has been expanded and successful city-wide programs have been developed. She is an active member of the Englewood Rotary Club and is the current as well as a past chair of Rotary District 7490 Chair of Peace and Conflict Resolution. Since 2016 Charlotte has focused on advocacy and justice for immigrants who have come to the US for political asylum. In 2014 she attended an NCJW program that presented First Friends of NJ NY, a 20-year-old NGO whose mission is to "uphold the inherent dignity and humanity of detained immigrants and asylum seekers." She is now an active Board member of First Friends, making visits to people in detention at one of our local jails, mentoring new volunteers and promoting advocacy. Since 2009, Charlotte has been a life member of NCJW and served on the Board of Project S.A.R.A.H. which also honored her in 2010. Charlotte has two daughters, Lindsay Mara and Ava Lauren, both of whom are attorneys. This award will be presented to Charlotte at the NCJW BCS Zoom Installation on June 15.

WOMAN OF THE SECTION AWARD NANETTE MATLICK



Nanette Matlick moved to New Jersey in 1954 with two small children. Soon after, with 2 more children, she got involved in a small synagogue in Hasbrouck Heights and served as sisterhood president for two years. When her children reached school age, she became involved in their education, starting a cultural enrichment program for the elementary school. Once her children were grown, she began working as an administrative assistant for an electronic company. She was there for 20 years.

Upon retiring Nanette was looking for things to keep her busy. She attended an After Breast Cancer lecture, sponsored by NCJW, where she met Connie Hochberg. Connie told her all about National Council and invited her to NCJW's annual paid up membership luncheon. At this luncheon she heard about all the good work that NCJW supports. With her interests and background, she knew she'd be a perfect fit, becoming a life member.

Shortly after she joined, she was asked to participate on the scholarship committee. She continued for over twenty years and is currently co-chair. During her twenty-four years in the Section, Nanette has been dedicated to NCJW in many aspects. She was vice president of membership, successfully bringing in many new members. As vice president of fundraising, she organized two successful trips, one being to Woodlock, the other Kislak Day Camp for seniors. The Section was given \$100 for every member who attended, thus raising \$1.400.

She was vice-president of community service for one year, and vice president of administration for two years. Nanette served on many committees: HIPPY, Holley Center, the Waiting Room, Rockleigh Gift Shop, Program Committee, Future Planning and Development, and the Nominating Committee. She also ran several functions: Game Day for three years, Installation, and two successful summer parties. Nanette was chairperson for Solos for two years, where she planned trips to the Chihuly Glass exhibit at the NY Botanical Gardens, to Cape May and Wildwood Crest, and the last to Montreal and Quebec.

She is the proud great-grandmother of seventeen great grandchildren and counting. Nanette is grateful NCJW was available to her for all these years and is honored to be receiving this award. This award will be presented to Nanette at the NCJW BCS Virtual Installation on June 15.
